

LOS ANGELES—The winners of Congressman Xavier Becerra’s 18th annual Student Art Competition were announced yesterday at Children’s Institute Headquarters, Otis Booth Campus. This year’s competition drew 80 contestants from high schools throughout California’s 31st Congressional District, reflecting the theme “Heroes of Our Time.”

Becerra said. “I salute the student artists who produced the inspiring works on display today—and especially the teachers who are doing more with less each day. All participants received a congressional certificate of recognition and tickets to attend a Dodger game this July, where the top three winners will be featured on Dodger Vision before the game.

Each year, thousands of young artists nationwide participate in the national congressional art competition, "An Artistic Discovery," in which members of Congress across the country have the privilege of finding many of tomorrow's great artists. Since 1982, over 650,000 high school students have entered their works of art for consideration.
